On the television this past Monday there was a replay of the meeting of the House of Representatives concerning a bill to approve gay marriage in our state. As you may know, we are the only New England state which has not approved of legalizing gay marriage. I did not catch the entire program, but what I saw was not encouraging for those who do not want to approve this bill. Those speaking in defense of gay marriage were well spoken, reasonable and at times passionate because they believe that this is a question of justice and equality, but the one or two representatives I heard speaking against the bill did not offer a powerful presentation of their position. Yet it is not yet clear how this bill, now passed by the House, will fare in the Senate.

But where do we stand as Catholics? First of all, our church is on record as defending the rights of people who are homosexual to be treated with the same consideration and concern and love as those who are heterosexual. Thus it could be argued that our church should favor the acceptance of gay marriage. But that is not the case because the official position or our church is that those who find themselves to be homosexual may not engage in sexual activity because homosexual activity is itself sinful.

I suspect that many Catholics today may question this position. They may not want to equate heterosexual and homosexual sex and may therefore want to continue to limit the word <u>marriage</u> to heterosexual couples, but they are probably not comfortable with saying that homosexual persons must be celibate. If that is their view, then they are in conflict with the Church's traditional position. What to do?

After the 4:00PM Mass on Saturday, February 2, the Feast of St. Blaise, we will have the blessing of throats.

Lent begins on <u>February 13</u> this year. To sum up the Lenten requirements, Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

### REFLECTION ON THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS THE CARPENTER'S SON

This week the other shoe drops. Last week Jesus spoke in a Nazareth synagogue and now we will hear the people's reaction to his message. A hint: they will try to throw him off a cliff.

To see why, look at how bold Jesus was. First he searched out a prediction of the Messiah from the book of Isaiah. Here are the very words he read in the synagogue:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord (Isaiah 61: 1-3)

The people loved him for this.

But then he applied the reading to himself! He said, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing" (Gospel)! "This scripture passage" was known to all as referring to the Messiah. They saw clearly that Jesus was claiming to be the Messiah!

The synagogue was stunned. He had grown up in their midst. He was the carpenter's son, the one they used to see weekly in this same synagogue. Why in the world would a local man come up with such a bizarre story?

We already know why. At the Jordan river, when he had received baptism, the heavens opened up and the Holy Spirit descended upon him and a voice from the heavens said, "You are my beloved son, and in you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:21-22)!

The Father's voice, out loud! Jesus' public ministry had begun. He was openly the anointed servant of God.

Immediately he fled into the desert to brood and to pray. His divinity formerly had been lodged mainly at the depths of his human awareness. Now it had to be drawn up into consciousness and dealt with.

Not only did he know the answer deeply, but he was human as well and he was attracted to the wrong answers too, ones suggested by the devil. Turn his divinity into self-satisfaction, into power, into reputation. He was authentically tempted, but each time he refused.

Now in the power of the Spirit he came back to Nazareth, as Luke says. It becomes obvious why he selected that passage from Isaiah in the synagogue. Isaiah's words were about him! He had heard it from God at his baptism.

How were the Nazarenes supposed to have any understanding of this? He looked like a mad-man claiming equality with God! To them he was insulting simultaneously his home town, his people, Israel, and God.

"He is out of his mind!" they shouted.

Jesus tells them that neither Elijah nor Elisha, great prophets, could work their miracles in Israel, but went elsewhere to do them. "No prophet is accepted in his own native place," he said.

Suddenly he is one of the prophets!

They pull him out to a cliff, planning to annihilate such a blasphemer. He escaped somehow but now the ball was in motion. This scene—and it is the first one described in his public ministry—forecasts his remaining life. First loved and accepted, then led to his death.

In the coming months we will see him carry out all of this. What will he do? We must find out, because we are to be filled with the same Holy Spirit.
