



Happy Easter to you! If you are a stranger to our church, we welcome you and hope that you will come every Sunday from now on. If we see you every weekend, we wish you the peace of the risen Savior.

Gathering for Mass each weekend is the bedrock of our faith because our faith is a community adventure. Jesus founded a community. Saint Paul, first an enemy of that community, then became a member and founded many new communities, first in Turkey and then in Macedonia and Greece. He did not stay very long in any of these communities, except the ones in Ephesus and Rome, but he wrote letters to them to encourage them in their faith. And these letters have been preserved and are now part of our New Testament.

Some today claim that they are personally religious but do not feel the need to belong to a community. They may indeed be religious, but they cannot and should not claim to be Christians because there is no Christ independent of the community which he founded. And we Catholics believe that this community, unfortunately divided into many different Christian churches today, nevertheless finds its fullest expression in the Catholic Church, a world-wide community held together through two millennia by its bishops scattered throughout the world but united with each other in and through their communion with the bishop of Rome. And so in our prayer today we will pray for our bishop here in Rhode Island, Thomas Tobin, and for our new pope, Francis, bishop of Rome.

May we who belong to the community here at St. Charles grow in our faith this Easter season! And may you who are visiting us also find a Christian community in which your faith may grow! Who knows, maybe even in our little community here.

TONS OF HURRICANE SANDY DEBRIS IS CHOKING WINNEPAUG POND WILDLIFE & HABITAT. CLEANUP NEEDE BEFORE NESTING SEASON.

Hurricane Sandy left over 100 tons of debris on the north shore of Winneapaug Pond in Westerly, RI. Serve Rhode Island is teaming up to send crews into the area to haul out debris from the ecologically sensitive wildlife and salt pond shellfishing area. Broken building materials, decking, roof tops, content of storm demolished Atantic Avenue stores including unknown amounts of household detergents and other chemicals are buried in the debris piles. Clean up is needed before nesting season! Beginning Saturday, March 16 volunteer crews are needed from 9AM to 4Pm every Saturday through April. If you and help, sign up today. All the debris needs to be transported about 200 yards from the pond's edge to Shore Road, down a car-width dirt/grass path. pickup trucks would work as well. REFLECTION ON THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

EASTER WAITING

. . . Natural heart's ivy, Patience masks Our ruins of wrecked past purpose. There she basks Purple eyes and seas of liquid leaves all day.*

The word patience haunts me this Easter. I know, the promise of all ages has now been fulfilled in the Resurrection, and we rejoice. We sing by faith and trust about Jesus rising again. We say to one another what I now say to you. Happy Easter! Happy, happy Easter!

Even so, we have to wait for our slow selves to take it all in. We must bide our time.

As if to illustrate this fact, the very length of the Vigil Service makes us wait and wait. There are ten readings, together with a candle lighting ceremony ("Light of Christ"), and numerous Baptisms and Confirmations and whatnot else. Patience is the name of the game, maybe for the same reason Jesus made Mary and Martha wait and makes our souls wait to believe. So very long, our tired backs say.

But salvation history is long too. The readings tell it in sequence as we hide in the candle-lit dark of Easter Vigil. How God created us and blessed us, how he called on and counted on Abraham, how he rescued the Hebrew people as they ran from their captors in the desert journey (and ran from God too). how for a "brief moment" God lost patience and turned away but then "with enduring love" took his people back, offering water to the thirsty and grain to the poor. Are you able to trust this? How much? "Be my people and I will be your God," he keeps saying.

Finally the Gospel proclamation. Empty tomb! The women in scripture believe immediately, the men don't.

Men have to wait. Maybe each of us, man or woman, has cried out to God, "You could get rid of all this waiting if you wanted to. Why five weeks of Lenten delay? Why the eons of your seeming absence through history? How does an Easer celebration make up for all that?"

Peace. Remember how Jesus was so casual when he heard that his friend Lazarus was dying in a place not far away? He delayed four days, or in other words "forever" in emotional time. Mary and Martha, his close friends, did without him as they buried their brother and grieved. When at last he arrived, each sister cried words of laceration to him, "You could have saved our brother!"

Jesus wept. And then he replied, "I am the resurrection and the life."

Today we concentrate on that statement of his. We give ourselves quiet time, maybe years of it, maybe a lifetime, to let the meaning of Easter Resurrection sink in.

Do you believe Jesus is risen from the dead? If not, how much further do you have to go? Here is some help. The greatest of all Easter truths is that God's love is stronger than life itself, stronger than death. The Resurrection is molded out of love. If you know that, blessed are you as you come to be-
