

But, for everyone else, that is a good wage. No, it is really a minimum wage, because people cannot live on less than that. Anything less than that means that the worker cannot rent an apartment and buy food but will have to choose between one or the other, and that is impossible. People need both food and lodging. So, do not vote for anyone who is against a minimum wage of \$15!

We have been in contact with the pastorto-be of our parish, Fr. Dennis Reardon, who will replace me on July 1. He plans to keep things just as they are. That is welcome news because those in our parish on salary were afraid that they might lose their jobs. Thank God, that is not the case. Fr. Reardon wants them all to remain in place. We are all breathing a sight of relief.

We are going to see if we can get Fr. Reardon to come over here and celebrate Mass for us before July 1 so that you all will have a chance to meet him. Of course the first matter to be settled is the establishment of a new Mass schedule for our parish. At All Saints he has a Mass at 4 P.M. on Saturday and three Masses on Sunday: 7:30, 10:00 and noon. If he added our two Masses, he would be celebrating six Masses in two days. That is obviously too many Masses for him to handle. So he will have to find priestly help or cut down on the number of Masses. Let us hope he can find priests to help him.

DEATH

When someone we know is diagnosed with serious sickness, we are shocked, and so is he, as we take in the possibility that he might die.

There is something perplexing about this reaction, isn't there? None of us is getting out of this life alive. And it is foolishness to think that we do not know the time of our death. It is sometime between now and the time when you would be 110 years old. (Who lives past 110?)

So death is inevitable, and we know at least roughly when it will come. The closer you get to 110, the closer it is; but, of course, we also know that you could get hit by a bus today.

Rats! you might think, this is a truly depressing thought. Why call it to our attention? It is better to be shocked and surprised when it comes.

But listen to the Second Reading. What does it say? When death comes, this is what it brings:

Our Lord himself comes to encourage you to weep over all the hardship of your past life, and then he himself wipes those tears away from your eyes.

And there is not only a new heaven, but also a new earth. What do you expect from earth? Well, earth isn't disembodied. Earth is dirt, plants, animals, the whole thing that God made when he created in the beginning, as Genesis explains it to us.

Only this time there will be no pain and suffering. So there may be great sea beasts, as Genesis says (Gn 1:21), but they won't hurt anything; and neither will any of the other animals. If you want to play with lions, what's to stop you?

In fact, even humans won't hurt anything, in that great and wonderful time. Now that is a thought hard to take in, isn't it? But in that new earth, you can be yourself, open, vulnerable, and still totally safe and at ease, because the people around you won't hurt anything, you included.

And all of this is wrapped up in the tender love of the Lord. He himself will welcome you to this new world and to himself by telling you, "Come away, beloved. The winter is past; the flowers appear on the earth!" (Song 2:10-12)

True joy begins on the other side. What is there to fear about this?
