

"The branch of the vine does not worry, and toil, and rush here to seek for sunshine, and there to find rain. No: it rests in union and communion with the vine; and at the right time, and in the right way, is the right fruit found on it. Let us so abide in the Lord Jesus."



At a talk recently I heard that we Roman Catholics are the largest denomination of Christians in the country, and the second largest group is made up of former Catholics. Isn't that something! This talk was given by the president of Boston College High School at a reunion for the classes of 1954, 55, and 56. Now, please take into account two factors: I was sitting at the back of the room and my hearing leaves much to be desired. But I believe I heard these two figures correctly. Then, at our table (about eight of us from the class of 1954), people began to report on their own families. Many of them have grandchildren who are Episcopalians, the reason often being that a son has married an Episcopalian woman. Of course this must also mean that their Catholic sons did not insist upon a Catholic wedding, for if they had done so, the non-Catholic party would have had to promise to allow her Catholic husband to bring up the children Catholic. And the Catholic ethnic group with the largest losses is the Irish. That was especially relevant for us since most of us are Irish. And there was the proof right at our table: a bunch of Irish Catholics with Episcopalian grandchildren. Our own grandparents who had been persecuted by Protestants could never have foreseen such a day. What should we do? Live our own faith and pray that the future generations will do the same, and hope that perhaps someday in the distant future some Episcopalians, great grandchildren of Catholics, will take a look at the Catholic Church. Or better yet: hope for the day when Rome and Canterbury will be one again.

SHAME AND THE LORD

In the Gospel Reading, Jairus wades fearlessly into the crowd around Jesus and interrupts whatever Jesus is doing. Jairus is an important person, an official of the synagogue; and his twelve-year old daughter is dangerously sick. Jairus believes that Jesus could heal his daughter, but only if he comes right away. And so Jairus urges Jesus to drop everything and come.

And Jesus does turn immediately to go with Jairus. But then Jairus's interruption of Jesus is itself interrupted. Jesus stops dead and demands to know who touched him.

"Who touched you?" his disciples say in disbelief. Everybody touched you! You are in the middle of a big crowd pressing all around you.

But, as we know, there was someone who touched Jesus in a special way. She was a woman who had suffered from an issue of blood for twelve years, just as many years as Jairus daughter had been alive. Under Mosaic law, she was unclean all that time. Anyone who touched her was unclean. In fact, anyone who touched anything she sat on or slept on was unclean. She had spent all her money on doctors, but they only made her worse.

So she was poor, outcast, and scared of being noticed. Unlike Jairus, she didn't dare interrupt Jesus to press her own concerns on him. And now she had added this dreadful thing to all the others: she had made even Jesus unclean. She had touched him. No wonder she was trembling when she had to face Jesus. Shame such as hers makes a person desperate to be invisible.

In her great need, she had not been willing to put herself forward, as Jairus had done. She was willing to be shamed, no-account, unnoticed—as long as she could be healed. But Jesus was not willing to tolerate her own estimation of herself. He made the official of the synagogue wait for her. "Daughter," Jesus says to her, "your faith has saved you."

In that one word, 'daughter,' Jesus healed her shame as well as her blood-flow. He showed her and all the crowd around her that she was to him what Jairus's daughter was to Jairus.

And so Jairus was not the only one who cared for his daughter on that day. ~Eleonore Stump
