

Focusing the Gospel

To the point: What is written in the law?" Jesus asks the "scholar of the law." Many would tend to answer by citing the Ten Commandments or civil law. But the lawyer in the Gospel answered correctly when he named love as the law. Law is not about keeping rules, but about loving others. Eternal life is not inherited by keeping laws, but by caring for others and treating them with mercy. The law of love teaches us to "love ... with all ... with all ... with all ... " Love is nothing less than the unconditional gift of self.

Connecting the Gospel ...

... to the first reading: The Law is not "mysterious and remote," but is "already in [our] mouths and in [our] hearts." We "have only to carry it out" and, as the Gospel reminds us, it bears the human face of our neighbor in need.

... to experience: As a framework to guide human behavior, law is good and necessary. Even when rearing children, we teach them to go beyond mere observance of laws' external demands to grasping the laws' deeper intent: building a community of care, respect, mercy—love.

Our church is missionary by nature. Each of us as baptized Catholics is called to share in the work of evangelization. The diocese of Providence collaborates with mission groups every year to raise funds for their missions through a program called **THE MISSIONARY COOPERATIVE PLAN**. They also have about 110 seminarians in their seminary in Nigeria. Their mission in Malawi provides rehabilitation and support for orphans who lost their parents to AIDS. They need our financial assistance to continue this mission. They also need funds to: 1) provide portable water for communities they serve in Chad and Nigeria; 2) Sponsoring seminarians, our future priests; 3) Supporting priests in the founding/building of new churches. WHAT MUST I DO?

In the Gospel Reading, a lawyer asks Jesus, "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus says to the lawyer, "Well, how do you read the law?" Without hesitation, the lawyer gives Jesus the answer, which the lawyer already knew: "Love God wholly and your neighbor as yourself."

"Right!" Jesus tells him. "You do that, and you'll live."

"But wait," the lawyer says, "who is my neighbor?"

And then Jesus tells the lawyer the parable of the bad priest and the bad Levite and the good Samaritan. Then Jesus finishes with another question to the lawyer: "Which of these was the neighbor of the robbery victim?"

And the lawyer gives the answer he has to give: "the good neighbor was the Samaritan."

Notice the oddness of the lawyer's first question. He doesn't ask: what is the best way to soar in love of God? He asks: what must I do inherit eternal life? He is looking for the minimum necessary to get into heaven, isn't he?

But eternal life is a union, a marriage, with God. Who would want to get married to someone who said, "what's the minimum I can do for you and with you and still get you to marry me?"

So Jesus gets the lawyer himself to answer his question, and the lawyer gives the right answer. What you have to do, the minimum necessary, is everything. Love God wholly, and love your neighbor as yourself.

This is a disconcerting answer, of course, because in this life none of us is ever going to do everything. So if everything is the minimum necessary, then none of us is getting in.

And so the lawyer tries on his original move again. He wants a definition of neighbor which gives him the minimum number of people to count as neighbors he has to love.

But Jesus upends the lawyer's continuing desire for a minimum by giving him another maximum: everyone you can love is your neighbor. If you can do good to him, he counts as your neighbor.

And that is why what we must do to inherit eternal life is come to Christ. The lawyer's own answers to his questions are right. But giving everything in love for God is a holiness we can find only through Christ's unstinting outpouring of love for us.
