By the time these words reach you, our city will have celebrated its 125th anniversary. I hope you have enjoyed the celebration and discovered our St. Charles Borromeo banner at the corner of Social and N. Main St. Albert Beauparlant promised us a good spot for our banner, and he certainly came through on his promise. May this celebration help our city to carry on in these difficult times!

Fr. St-Godard is hosting a celebration on Sunday, the 24th of November, to celebrate the founding of our city in 1888 and has invited the churches which were then in existence in the city to take part in it. There are four Protestant churches and two Catholic one which were then in existence. Our church and Precious Blood are the two Catholic churches. As you well know, our church was the first Catholic church of the city. The parish was founded in 1846 and the present church building was built in 1868. When you see pictures in the local papers of Monument Square at the time of the city's founding, if they are looking north, the tower of our church is clearly visible. Recently in The Call there was an article describing the renovations taking place at the Cathedral in Providence. It mentioned the fact that the Cathedral and two other churches in the diocese, St. Mary's in Newport and St. Joseph's on Hope St. in Providence, were the only churches built in Rhode Island by the famous 19th century architect Patrick Keeley. We have to correct this article. There were four such churches, our parish church being the fourth.

REFLECTION ON THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

IMAGINE THIS

It is said that we are made in the image and likeness of God.

But this does not seem very likely, sorry to say.

Quite a few other "images and likenesses" settle into our eyes and ears instead. Glance widescale over all the world. Tribe against tribe, religion against religion, genocide, racialism, and so on. These are now a regular feature.

Think about marriage, that institution which still cradles the future of—not just of its delicate offspring—but of whole cultures. Hasn't marriage become something extra, or "just for the time being," followed by divorce, which is a lot of trouble so why get married in the first place?

Wouldn't you agree that sexual mores in the Western world are in the process of finally separating themselves from commitment, responsibility, and even care? It is all in the name of freedom, but at what price?

And how about a number of Roman Catholic priests and bishops whose actions have either directly or indirectly hurt the lives of children and young people, while still professing to be dedicated to Jesus? "There is no greater love than to give up your life for your friend," Jesus said. How is it even possible that people who profess formally the image and likeness of God could possibly do the complete, evil opposite?

I know, I know, the good has to be factored into the mix as well. But with so much powerful loss stirred in, what can be left of the image of God in human beings?

The poet E. E. Cummings wrote a particularly strong poem that includes the following lines:

King Christ, this world is all a-leak, and life preservers there are none, and waves that only he can walk who dares to call himself a man.

It sounds like a general maxim, but the person he refers to in this poem, who did in fact become a man, was Jesus. He let himself be rocked and wrecked and finally sunk. Then he resurrected and walked and continued to walk the waves of our rough, drowning world.

Here was a man who was God, certainly, but also a human being. Within himself, in the place where it matters most, Jesus had complete openness to love. He received it and he let it go out to others. Do you and I dare to be a human being? Deep within our own selves, in imitation of Jesus, are we capable of making room for God the lover to live in us? If we gradually allow it to, love-incarnate will come to life in us.

If we addict ourselves instead, if we "exalt" ourselves, as Jesus puts it in the Gospel, we will wrap our souls in layer after layer of fraud. We will try to become our possessions, we will try to become what other people think of us, what culture manipulates us to be.

Here is a better image than the ones we are fed daily: tiny ship-worthy boats that are us—if only we do not think we are sprawling ocean liners, possessing everything. In a word, if we "conduct our affairs with humility" (First Reading), we can allow God to love us and live in us.

And then we will make a difference in the world. We will become the image and likeness of God's tolerance shining forth.
