

REFLECTION ON THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS WHAT TO DO?

Our First Reading states the problem.

"Deliberations of mortals are timid, and unsure are our plans. The body weighs down the soul, the earth weighs down the mind. . . . What is within our grasp we find with difficulty."

These words apply to all life, don't they? We have many problems. What are we to do?

As a first answer, try these words:

God grant me the serenity

to accept the things I cannot change;

courage to change the things I can;

and wisdom to know the difference.

This is the Serenity Prayer, well-known, and also deep. It shows us what humility is: be who you are, not more, not less. Trust in God for everything you cannot do. Let go, let God. But do have (realistically limited) courage.

Life here on earth, even though unsure and weighted down, is about humility.

A second answer is, we are meant to love. To exercise real, toiling, sweating love.

Look at the apostle Paul in the Second Reading—the fiery, tempestuous Paul, now an old man in prison. We are reading a personal letter here, one the old man wrote to Philemon (a leader, possibly in a church in Colossae, which was an ancient city of Phrygia). It turns out that Philemon's slave Onesimus has run away and has come to Paul. Paul has received him and has became like a father to him. The result is Onesimus' conversion to Christianity. Paul now sends him back to Philemon not as a slave but "as a man and in the Lord."

Listen to the language Paul uses. "I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you." Imagine. The one Paul sends is so dear that he refers to him as "his own heart."

This is a true personal love. It is what life here on earth is all about.

3) A third answer, is one that the Gospel tells us. It is shocking.

Jesus commands each of us to

- a. hate your father, mother, children, brothers, sisters,
 - and your own life, and
- b. renounce all your possessions, and
- c. carry your own cross just as he carries his.

Hang on, don't panic. These sound horrible, but let us examine them.

- a. The command, "Hate your father, mother ... and your own life," has many interpretations but the only one that really makes sense is spelled out in the parable. Be smart. Figure it out. Isn't God worth more love than anything else? Then give God your greatest love. Know that everyone and everything else flows from that love, not visa versa. Whatever opposes love of God, shuck it off ("hate it").
- b. "Renounce all your possessions." If you are tempted to love material things above all else, let them go. Love God above all things and everything else only in proportion.
- c. "Carry your cross"! Why? Because otherwise you will be trying to envision a world that does not have real pain in it, where you will not suffer. Sorry, but nasty surprises are waiting for you. Instead, "carry your cross" puts you in touch with a real world in which good and evil both exist.
- So. What is life about here on earth?

It is about being humble, about loving others truly—loving God above all things, and bearing the suffering along with Jesus.
