It was an unbelievable sight we watched on the television as the airplanes went into the buildings and they began to dissolve. Then we were attacked. Now our nation is weighing the option of attacking Syria. Pope Franics has appealed to us to seek other means of helping the Syrian people. If you are radio listener or if you attend daily Mass here, you will know that we did have an hour of prayer last Saturday before Mass to honor the pope's plea. REFLECTION ON THIS WEEKEND'S READINGS

PRODIGAL US

Who would be dumb enough to adore something they constructed with their own hands! Do you cook dinner and then adore it?

Yet in the First Reading we find God becoming quite upset because the people put up cheap products as their God. While Moses is away, they build a golden calf and make it their God!

Ridiculous!

God had a different idea of his relation to the people. my paraphrase:

What about a two-way covenant of love? 'I will be your God and you will be my people. I will love you more than you can ask or imagine.' Won't you just love me in return?

They refuse and willfully run away to fill their paltry desires.

Picture God's anger as resembling what a parent would have toward a seriously disobedient child. He shouts at Moses.

"Let me alone, then, that my wrath may blaze up against them to consume them." (First Reading)

Moses acts as a family friend and says,

"Why, O Lord, should your wrath blaze up against your own people, whom you brought out of the land of Egypt with such great power and with so strong a hand?... Let your blazing wrath die down; relent in punishing your people."

Just calm down. They are just children. Give them some time. God agrees.

Yet, is this good advice? They were worshipping false gods! Maybe you and I do not fall down and adore all the man-made items that take up our time, but have you ever run away from God so you can have whatever arouses your own addictions?

What would that be? Beautiful houses, refrigerators, cars, magazines and clothes. And the famous "bottom line" in our businesses. And the great score at golf or softball or hunting or Bridge, or looking good. Or clothes or shoes. And money. And cigarettes. Or maybe it is drink, or voyeur sex. And do some of us worship the current "stars" in Hollywood or on MTV. Didn't we gain all these with our own hands?

The Gospel looks at the prodigal son. He is a great example of false worship. He left what he felt were the "shackles" of home life and of the obvious love of his father. He made himself "free"! Maybe his life of dissipation was an equivalent of our many houses, refrigerators, cars, magazines and clothes.

It doesn't work. The prodigal came crawling back home. We would expect his father to say, "Oh sure, now you turn up thinking everything will be just like it used to be. Well think again, pal." But instead his father actually runs to meet his son, embraces him and orders a huge feast of welcome. Did the young man get what he deserved? No. He got what his father prepared for him: entire forgiveness.

Here is the point. God does not want to keep us from the things we are attracted to. He wants us to value them in proportion to our real home.

Love God above all things. Then you can love everything and everyone else as they deserve.

We fail in doing this, of course, like the ancient Israelites and the prodigal son. But God puts his arms around us and cries, "Welcome, welcome, welcome. You came back! We can love one another again, can't we?"

And again we promise to do our best.
