

As I write this, it is Tuesday, November fourth, the feast of our patron saint, Charles Borromeo, and voting day. The voting station at Park View was empty this morning around ten o'clock. Maybe some people, especially those of the Catholic persuasion, are feeling that at least in the gubernatorial contest there is no one for whom they can cast their vote because all three candidates are pro-abortion. But they may also feel that if they do vote for one of the three candidates, they will not choose the one who claims to be Catholic yet also presents herself as more in line with the views of Planned Parenthood rather than those of the Catholic Church. However, it is also possible that most voters, even Catholics, don't consider this issue of abortion as important enough to determine their vote. If that is the case, then on Wednesday morning we will discover that even though Rhode Island is thought to be heavily Catholic in population, it has elected a woman who claims to be Catholic but is proabortion. What will that tell us? It will tell us that most Rhode Islanders are pro-choice and that the Catholic vote, if there is such a thing, was not strong enough to prevail over those who are pro-choice.

I am hoping that this will not happen. If it does, it will mean that we have to continue our campaign to protect the life of the unborn. Roman society gave a father the right of life and death over his children. I do not know whether that right pertained simply to children not yet born or also to children after birth. In any case, in time the new faith in Christ overcame these ancient laws and protected children both before and after birth. We are now fighting this same old battle. Can we convince our society, especially women and our fellow Catholics, that the life of the unborn child is sacred? I hope we can.

YOU ARE THE TEMPLE OF GOD

Although the basilica of St. John Lateran is the cathedral of the Holy Father in Rome, today's liturgy focuses not on the Petrine ministry but on the place of God's abode, the temple. The First Reading is about Solomon's temple, and the Gospel tells of Jesus coming to stay in the home of Zacchaeus.

Writing to the Corinthians, Paul asks them: "Are you not aware that you are the temple of God, and that the spirit of God dwells in you?" Notice his use of the singular: "the temple of God is holy, and you are that temple." He has in mind the community of God's people as the temple of God: "from living stones, your chosen people, you built an eternal temple to your glory."

Is this temple (the People of God) only for the presence of God? What else is there in this temple? Are there false gods as well, such as the gods of wealth and power? Do the people in this temple worship the one true God, or do they bow down before other gods, such as economic and political systems? Do the people in this temple work hard at "creating its beauty from the holiness of our lives?"

The Church has more often been called the edifice of God. ... This edifice is adorned by various names: the house of God in which dwells His family; the household of God in the Spirit; the dwelling place of God among men; and, especially, the holy temple.

This temple, symbolized by places of worship built out of stone, is praised by the holy Fathers and, not without reason, is compared in the liturgy to the Holy City, the New Jerusalem. As living stones we here on earth are being built up along with this City.
