The entrance antiphon, the phrase to be said or recited at the beginning of Mass, for this third Sunday of Advent is "Rejoice in the Lord always...." In Latin the word is Gaudete. Hence the name for this Sunday. We are being told to rejoice because the birth of the Lord is near at hand. And yet the weather and the news do not offer us much to rejoice about. On this Tuesday, the 9th of December, it is slipperv. Yet many people made it out to Mass this morning. I tell them that they should not do this, especially since many of them are already octogenarians, but they won't listen.

That is the weather. But the news is also not very promising. More than fifty years have passed since our nation was involved in race riots in our cities and in the deaths of young men and women who went south on buses to protest the segregation laws. Now we are experiencing new demonstrations because of confrontations between the police and black people, especially black youths. "When will they ever learn...?" Wasn't that a song by Peter, Paul and Mary?

People will differ on the verdicts given which exonerated police officers. Nevertheless, there are just too many questionable cases emerging for the public to pretend that there is not a problem in the way black people are often treated by police. Of course questionable behavior on the part of some police reflects the prejudices which still exist in our communal or societal heart. We and the police will have to be careful in the future. And that is true not only with respect to black people but also with Latinos and people who look like they may come from Muslim countries.

We have just three black police men and women here in Woonsocket. That is probably too few given the number of our police force (around 80, I think) and the number of black people in our city. Maybe more black police officers would help us here to avoid the confrontations which have taken place in other Fr. Finnegan, S. I. cities.

REJOICE IN THE LORD ALWAYS

It is a time for rejoicing: "The Lord is near! The earth rejoices in hope of the Savior's coming and looks forward with longing to his return at the end of time."

We again encounter John the Baptist echoing Isaiah's oracle: "Make straight the way of the Lord!" This time it appears alongside Paul's ringing exhortation: "Rejoice always, never cease praying, render constant thanks."

It also appears—quite significantly—alongside two passages that speak of salvation for the lowly.

The First Reading has Isaiah tell of being sent "to bring glad tidings to the lowly, to heal the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners."

The responsorial psalm is Mary's song from the first chapter of Luke: "The hungry he has given every good thing, while the rich he has sent empty away."

The Alleluia follows this with a rewording of Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord ... sent me to bring Good News to the poor."

The message of today's liturgy is clear. The salvation we await with joy will liberate both the individual and the community, and its special focus will be the poor and lowly, not the rich and powerful.

"As the earth brings forth its plants ... so will the Lord God make justice."

Jesus comes so that our community might no longer be scarred with poverty and oppression but might instead "be preserved whole and entire, spirit, soul, and body."

As a leaven in the world, the Church is called to participate in human affairs and to recognize in the poor, the afflicted, and the oppressed the presence of the Lord summoning the Christian community to action. —Gerald Darring
