This year is dedicated to religious life. Do you know what is meant by that that phrase? Religious life is a life marked by the three vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. You might not know about it in an abstract way but you are familiar with it in a concrete way. If you attended Catholic schools as a youngster, you were probably taught by Sisters. Sisters were women who took the three vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. There are still such women today, though they are much smaller in number than they were two generations ago, and their work now is not as concentrated on schools as it was in the past. Poverty for Sisters meant and means that they live out of a "common pot." They depend on their community for the necessities of life, and their earnings go to that common pot. Chastity means that they lead single lives, and obedience means that the major decisions concerning their lives are guided and even decided by those who are chosen for leadership roles in their communities. These three vows are seen as ways of helping those who take them to live Christ-like lives of charity.

I have been speaking of Sisters, but there are men religious as well. Indeed, they are very close to us here at St. Charles, for the Brothers of the Sacred Heart who take these same vows live across the street from our church, and the two priests who serve you at St. Charles are also religious. So, you see, you do know what the phrase religious life means. Fr. Finnegan, S. J.

#### THE BUILDING IS GOD'S

By the time of the First Reading, David was King. He had won a lot of victories, and he was rich and prosperous too. He had a marvelous house, built of wood and stones. But that most precious thing, the ark of God, was housed only in a tent.

David thought about the fact that God had only a tent while he, the King, had a great house; and so he made a decision to build a house for God. He made it his responsibility to take care of God, you might say.

And God laughed at him. Through the prophet Nathan, God told David, "I will build you a house!"

And so God did. The Son of God, the one we wait for in Advent, was born of David's lineage. Christ is that house God built for David. The kingly line of David's lineage finds its everlasting fulfillment in Christ.

David's son Solomon did eventually build a house for the ark of God in Jerusalem, and it was magnificent. But any earthly building, even the great temple in Jerusalem, is puny by comparison with the house that God built for David, and for all God's people, in Christ.

David did well to revere the ark of God, just as we do well to revere the Church. But it was foolish of David to feel that it was his responsibility to provide a house for God. God wants our love, but he does not need us to protect him. Without our help, God is still himself, Lord of heaven and earth. It is he who will provide for us, and not the other way around.

When we feel homeless, then, or motherless, or forsaken and abandoned, we can remember the lesson that David learned for us. God has already built us a house in Christ, and every Christian finds a home in that house. Each of us has a home and a welcome in the Son of David, who is the house God built for David, and for us.

And so we can wait for his coming in peace. All the building is God's.
