

As I write these words, it is still the Monday before Christmas. But by the time you read them Christmas 2014 will be a memory, a fresh one but still a memory. This year's Christmas evoked memories of a Christmas a hundred years ago. In 1914 the Great War, later known to us a World War I, had just begun. German and English troops faced each other in Flanders in Belgium. At the time many thought that this war would be over in a few months, but it stretched on for four more years, claiming millions of young lives. But on Christmas Eve in 1914, as young soldiers faced each other, something extraordinary happened. The English soldiers could see that the German soldiers were placing little Christmas trees on the top of their trenches. And then someone began to sing a Christmas carol, one originally written in German but by then well known to the English soldiers as Silent Night. Miracle of miracles, the soldiers emerged from their trenches and moved towards each other, cautiously, no doubt, at first, but then with more confidence. Language must have been a barrier, but some of the Germans knew some English, and eventually the men began to exchange little gifts like cigarettes and candy. Then they played games of soccer. This truce did not last long. Eventually, the men returned to their trenches and the war began again. Twenty-two years later, despite the slaughter of the First World War, Europe engaged in another world war. We humans do not learn quickly. We keep making the same mistakes again and again. Theologically we could say that each generation commits its own sins. And those who pay for our sins are the young. It sounds foolish, but how about making a new rule. If nations wish to go to war, then let those who decide to do so be those who actually go. Not the young, but the middle-aged and older men and women making these decisions. Let them go first. That might put an end to war.

But for the moment we pause and rejoice in the presence among us of the Prince of Peace, Jesus the Lord, and ask him to make us peaceful Fr. Finnegan, S. J. people.

At least it would slow it down.

THE BUILDING IS GOD'S

By the time of the First Reading, David was King. He had won a lot of victories, and he was rich and prosperous too. He had a marvelous house, built of wood and stones. But that most precious thing, the ark of God, was housed only in a tent.

David thought about the fact that God had only a tent while he, the King, had a great house; and so he made a decision to build a house for God. He made it his responsibility to take care of God, you might say.

And God laughed at him. Through the prophet Nathan, God told David, "I will build you a house!"

And so God did. The Son of God, the one we wait for in Advent, was born of David's lineage. Christ is that house God built for David. The kingly line of David's lineage finds its everlasting fulfillment in Christ.

David's son Solomon did eventually build a house for the ark of God in Jerusalem, and it was magnificent. But any earthly building, even the great temple in Jerusalem, is puny by comparison with the house that God built for David, and for all God's people, in Christ.

David did well to revere the ark of God, just as we do well to revere the Church. But it was foolish of David to feel that it was his responsibility to provide a house for God. God wants our love, but he does not need us to protect him. Without our help, God is still himself, Lord of heaven and earth. It is he who will provide for us, and not the other way around.

When we feel homeless, then, or motherless, or forsaken and abandoned, we can remember the lesson that David learned for us. God has already built us a house in Christ, and every Christian finds a home in that house. Each of us has a home and a welcome in the Son of David, who is the house God built for David, and for us.

And so we can wait for his coming in peace. All the building is God's.
